This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Our curriculum is informed by the [model music curriculum](#) (March 2021), non-statutory guidance for teaching music from Key Stages 1 to 3

Our students have the opportunity to learn to sing and play an instrument during lesson time, such as through whole-class ensemble teaching in Year 7 and 8.

Students who choose to continue with their formal music education can study Eduqas GCSE music.

Trentham Academy is supported by the Character and Arts Foundation and by the City Music Service

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Students can take part in one-to-one, small-group and large-group tuition for instruments or voice with visiting peripatetic teachers from the City Music Service. These lessons incur a cost, but this is subsidised by the academy for disadvantaged students.

Students can join the choir and a variety of bands (which vary depending on the instruments students are learning to play)

Students can perform several times a year in assemblies, open events and concerts.

Students can attend performance clubs at lunchtime and after school.

Our music teacher uses tutor time to provide additional music opportunities to a wide range of students.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Year 7 students sing in assembly and singing informs part of the majority of music lessons at KS3.

There is a whole school performance at the end of every term which includes a music performance.

The Character and Arts Foundation has a strong links with the Halle orchestra and our Year 7 and KS4 music students attend a concert annually with no charge.

The Halle orchestra offers further opportunities for students to experience the music industry – also without charge.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

- We hope to increase lesson time to one hour per week from September 2026 for both Year 7 and Year 8.
- We are applying for grant funding for more musical instruments
